I enclose an email which I have sent to ZPA's Secretary, advising him of my reasons for including my Terms of Use on the Website.

I would suggest that any of you who are thinking of producing a website on behalf of Zurich Pensioners Association needs to carefully consider what my email advises.

I thought it appropriate to expand upon my reasons for taking the action which I have done today.

I've thought long and hard about what I have done. Had I been able to avoid this confrontation I would have done so. However, in my judgement backing down at this point would only have the delayed the inevitable. I also believe that postponing this would have made the consequences more serious at a later date.

What has precipitated my action is xxx's decision to commit the website to containing a hyperlink for xxxt and tell me afterwards. This is a minor irritation, and I have to say that had I been asked before the commitment was made, I would've probably agreed. The problem starts with what happens after this.

What worries me is the possibility that if I accept that others are given power to make commitments to third parties without my agreement, I would be gradually salamied into performing alterations which I would find it increasingly difficult to comply with. Eventually there would come a point at which I would find the decision made on my behalf to be unacceptable and refuse to comply with it.

The trouble is that I would be raising the issue too late. By then, my previous inaction could be construed as me having accepted that decisions by others commits me to actions promised by them.

Under certain circumstances, my then refusal could be construed by the party to which any promise has been made as a breach of contract. I would consequently be faced with the dilemma of complying with a commitment which I found unacceptable or alternatively face an action for damages for the contractual breach.

By making the terms clear now, there are two desirable outcomes. Firstly, I would be able to argue that the commitment was made by somebody who did not have the authority to make it. I would consequently be able to refer the organisation to the person who made the promise and suggest they sort the matter out between themselves.

Secondly, faced with the fact that they will be responsible for the consequences of failing to consult me, the person concerned will be motivated to make more-responsible decisions and are likely to consult me prior to making them.

Whilst I understand you may be unhappy with my action, I hope you will understand my reasoning. I am happy to comply with most of the decisions of the Executive Committee. However, this stops when they affect my wallet.
